How Nuacht TG4 exploits news exchange projects

Nuacht TG4 Ireland is a partner in two news exchange projects and we encourage all Circom members to attend the News Summit and News Exchange session, Athens Room Thursday, 2pm.

The first exchange is with BBC Alba, the gaelic channel in Scotland. Each week, one news item is exchanged between Nuacht TG4 and the An Là daily news programme on BBC Alba. The exchange is by FTP, and scripts are exchanged in English: Nuacht TG4 subtitles the BBC Alba item into Irish, while BBC re-voices the TG4 item into Scottish gaelic. The item is broadcast each Monday on Nuacht TG4.

Editorially, the selection of items is guided by political, cultural and

geographical issues which we feel would resonate with the BBC Alba audience. While there are great similarities of language and culture, the political and historical differences are substantial. The items are regularly the subject of positive feedback from audiences, and for an Irish audience offer a glimpse of the life and times of our neighbours in Scotland.

We also take part in a seasonal news exchange though WITBN, the World Indigenous Television Broadcasters Network, of which TG4 is a member. This is an organisation bringing together television stations in Asia, Africa, Australia, Europe and North America, all of whom deal with minority indigenous cultures in their countries.

The 13 episode series, Indigenous Insight, is produced and presented for WITBN by Maori Television of New Zealand. Members offer news items from their output. See: http://www.witbn.org/index.php/ii-indexuse/item/101-episode-02/2

A third series is planned for 2011, and there are talks underway to offer more regular news exchanges, including on a daily and on an ad hoc basis.

Circom plans new platform for programme coproduction and exchange

The Exchanges and Coproductions' session, London Room Thursday 3pm, will at last unlock the results of the survey about these matters addressed in 2010 by Circom to its members.

We can say already that the first results are in favour of development of programme exchange and coproduction. Nevertheless, Circom has to find new flexible solutions to satisfy most of its members, in order not to penalise members who want to advance but also not to adversely affect members who face restrictions.

During the session, guests will explain the existing regional exchange platforms they use and analyse the possibilities to link such structures within the framework of Circom's new exchange platform. Guests are expected from Nordvision, RAI, and from HRT, which runs the existing Circom exchange platforms.

In a pragmatic way, we will hear about current projects which could benefit Circom's new Exchange and Coproduction platform and discuss which structure Circom should put in place to develop the coordination of these projects.

During the following days of the conference, the Circom Exchange and Coproduction working group will coordinate separate meeting for discussions about the project presented in the session.

Prix Circom: Watch the best programmes and meet the winners

The Gala Awards (Thursday evening) are the showcase for the top talent of regional television. The winners of the categories will collect their awards and the winner of the Grand Prix will be announced. TVR Timisoara will broadcast a live programme on TVR3.

New this year: the "commended" in all but one category are invited to attend the conference free, as well as the winners. So, welcome all of you.

There are two new categories. The first is The Rising Star Award, sponsored by TVR in memory of our colleague Vanda Condurache from TVR lasi, and the

other is a Social Interaction and Viewer Support category proposed and sponsored by SVT Sweden. There are workshops and viewings (Friday, Saturday) inspired by the Prix. All the Prix entries are also

available to view in the Télétheque (Paris room).

This year there were almost 160 entries, 40 more than last year. The judging was in Fredrikstad as the guests of NRK Ostfold Norway. A review of each entry is in the Prix Report.

He introduces the winners of the Prix Documentary category, from TG4 Galway. This session must interest all who value the unique nature of regional production and broadcasting. Circom: Creating a New Strategy

We may assume all Circom activities like the annual conference, training, Prix and other projects have value for the individual stations. But does every station know how much it is paying and what it is paying for? Only if it does can it justify the money spent on Circom.

And has every station had the opportunity to indicate its needs and expectations of Circom to those who run the organisation on our behalf? Or put it the other way around: does Circom know what the needs and expectations are of the individual members?

In 2011, Circom has to create a new vision. Choices have to be made about what Circom should and can deliver in the future. This vision has been discussed

by the national co-ordinators of the member broadcasters during the Board meeting in Timisoara. Now all delegates should hear what the vision document

states and offer further views (Athens room, Thursday, 12 noon).

Taking into account your comments, the Executive Committee will prepare a Strategic Plan 2012-2015 to be approved by the European Board in November 2011.



Training: 20 Years of the Television Journalism Course at the Circom Conference

Circom training is at the heart of activities for its members. In Timisoara, a workshop for young television journalists has taken place before the conference - the 20th occasion such a course has been held.

Young journalists learn what makes interesting and balanced television news reporting. They are supported by a multi-national team of trainers and technicians who teach the best way to interview, deliver stand-uppers, how to tell a story through pictures and how to write to pictures in a concise and clear way.

The trainees produce a story in Timisoara that will also interest to their own audiences back home. They work with trainers to produce the stories which will

be show-cased (Athens room, Saturday 1030am).

Television journalism was the first Circom training activity. It has developed to match the needs of its member stations and Circom now has a comprehensive timetable of training throughout the year. In June and July, the Circom European Summer Academy takes place in Nuremburg for television and video journalists. In Budapest in October, a two-week course for video journalists is held and, in January, Circom provides a Training for Trainers course, allowing stations to send their leading professionals to the UK to learn the skills needed to train in their own stations.

As well as formal training, Circom organises one-off workshops for the benefit of members, such as those for Documentary production and the Senior Managers' Summit, both held here in Timisoara just before the conference.

Leader of the Circom Documentary workshop

Improving the quality of regional documentaries

Before conference, a two-day documentary workshop was held in Timisoara. Documentary makers from across Europe attended, representing countries from Hungary to Ireland, Romania to Norway.

The objective was to give delegates an insight into the different approaches to documentary production that other programme-makers are successfully using. The delegates shared production experiences, story-telling techniques and longer-form camera/edit skills.

Delegates were encouraged to bring work in progress, previous programmes and to bring along ideas for the future. There was an opportunity to view and discuss previous Prix Circom documentary category winners.

As well as providing a tool-kit of useful techniques in programme production, the workshop was intended to be motivational - inspiring delegates to take risks and create exciting documentaries that can captivate and entertain our audiences.

The documentary workshop was made possible by support from Circom and the Prix Circom Documentary Award sponsors the Dutch Cultural Media Fund, represented by John Appel, an award winning documentary maker from the Netherlands.

The workshop content and achievements will be shared in a special session (London room, Friday 9.30am) and there will be an opportunity to watch some of the best documentary entries for this year's prize.



The Senior Executives' Regional TV Summit

There has been a Summit of senior regional television executives, station heads and network leaders taking place in Timisoara on the day before the Conference formally starts.

For the first time, Circom Regional has brought together senior professionals from the regional television community to focus on the present and future of regional television and public service broadcasting in Europe. The managers have been sharing information on the current state of regional television in different countries, exchanging ideas and discussing the challenges.

Much of what has been said will prove an important guide for the future actions of Circom Regional.

The Summit was chaired by Bob Collins, chairman of the Broadcasting Authority of Ireland, the state regulatory body for all public funded and commercial radio and TV in the Irish Republic. Bob is the former director

general of RTÉ, the Irish national public service broadcaster. For many years he was a leading member of the EBU.

The Summit was "by invitation only". However, those taking part will - under Bob's guidance - share thoughts with all delegates on Thursday morning (0945 to 1200, Athens Room) in the keynote discussion session Doing It Better, Spending Less.

Timisoara: Landmark City in Romania's History

In 1989, Timişoara created a landmark of Romanian history as it pioneered the anti-communist Revolution. This made it front page news and seen on television screens throughout the world.

Timişoara is one of the biggest cities of Romania and an important economic and university centre, with a population of more than 350,000. It has been shaped by various cultures and civilizations. Turkish rule began in 1552 and lasted until 1716, when the city was conquered by Habsburg troops. Now it is famous for its multicultural life with Romanians, Hungarians, Germans, Serbs, Bulgarians and more living here.

In 1884, Timişoara was the first city in Europe to have electric public lighting. With many parks, public gardens, squares and green spaces, Timisoara has been called "the garden-city".

TVR Timisoara is the regional studio of Romanian public television (TVR) and covers the western part of Romania. It is on air eight hours a day with a wide range of programmes. These include current issues, live broadcasts from concerts, sport and other important events, as well as coverage from neighbouring and other European countries.

TVR Timisoara produces daily programmes broadcast on the regional channel and also on the national channels of TVR, especially TVR 3, which broadcasts only programmes produced by TVR's five regional studios. TVR's productions received over 100 prizes at national and international television festivals.
